It is hard to believe that we are coming to the end of another year but with the Christmas lights on and festivities in full swing there can be no doubt that 2012 is drawing to a close.

As we enter the season of Advent, we are grateful to be able to reflect positively on all that has been achieved since the summer. The school goes from strength to strength and I hope this newsletter will once again give you a flavour of all that has been going on in our very special school community.

There is so much activity in this busy and bustling school and I truly love being part of the fabric of Mercy College. I am honoured to be part of a staff that goes the extra mile, whether it involves working on the school musical well into the night, supervised study sessions and homework club, volunteering for Breakfast Club, extra-curricular sporting activities, cultural outings and field trips, CSPE projects, training courses, lunch time sports, art competitions, literacy programmes like DEAR and Accelerated Reader, extra tuition and so much more. Each year, each day, each minute brings something new and exciting and anyone who becomes part of our school or comes for a visit cannot help but feel the warm, welcoming and vibrant atmosphere.

Our first years are settling in very well and there is a lovely hard-working atmosphere in the group. Their Senior Prefects and the extended student leadership team have helped to answer their questions and put them at ease. 3rd and 6th Years have settled in well to more serious schoolwork and are still finding time to be involved in many of the school extra-curricular activities. The Transition Years are adapting well to a different type of year and are finding no difficulty at all engaging with the wide variety of activities on offer, from yoga to work experience.

Staff and students have been engaged in numerous learning opportunities and enriching activities, the most exciting of which is our participation in the Bridge 21 programme in Trinity College. To date, classes Uladh, Laighean and Transition Year have attended workshops in Trinity and produced excellent project work. Our students also continue to benefit from our strong links with Dublin City University. To date this year, girls have attended DCU for Shadowing Day, Discover DCU and Maths workshops. Over 20 of our 4th and 5th Years received DCU Achievement Awards for their academic, sporting, artistic and cultural work, as well as their contributions to their school and community.

The Student Council, Student Mentor Team, Green Committee and 4th Year Young Social Innovators have been very active and have shown great leadership throughout the term; leadership that has benefitted the school community and others, including Child Vision, Cystic Fibrosis Ireland and the Irish Wheelchair Association.

As with the wider community, Mercy College has not been immune from the effects of economic pressures as cuts continue to be applied to school staffing and budgets. However, I am delighted to say that we have not cut the provision of any subject for our students and that student supports such as guidance and counselling, breakfast club, after-school study, homework club and our range of extra-curricular activities have remained intact. This has been possible because of support from the School Completion Programme, our own Board of Management and the fundraising efforts of staff, students, parents and guardians.

Despite financial constraints, we have continued to make improvements to our building and classrooms so that the girls can enjoy a bright and fresh learning environment. New roller blinds have been installed in all classrooms. We are currently finalising the plans for the installation of a multi-sensory classroom to be ready early in the New Year.

These difficult economic times have also made very apparent to students the need to make the most of their education. We are extremely proud of the success enjoyed by our students who sat state examinations in 2012. The members of the Leaving Certificate class of 2012 are now undertaking university and further education courses in areas as diverse as Law, Engineering, Equine Science, Early Childhood Education, Event Management, Nursing Studies, Politics, International Relations, Teaching, Business Management, Science, Drama Studies, Art, Make-up Artistry, Social Care and Japanese. Mercy College is now represented in universities and colleges across the country including Trinity, UCD, DCU, NUI Maynooth and even the University of Limerick and Dundalk Institute of Technology.

Our Junior Certificate class also performed extremely well, with all students enjoying success and achieving certification. It is always heartening to see the girls achieve their potential and we look forward to supporting them to do the same at Leaving Certificate in the coming years.

It has been a particularly exciting term for three members of staff. We offer our warmest congratulations to Ms. Mary Boyle, Ms. Katrina Harrison and their husbands on the births of their baby girls Aoíbh and Ruth respectively. In addition, we wish Ms. Maedhbh Daltún every success and happiness as she leaves Mercy College to take up the position of Principal of St. Joseph's Secondary School, Stanhope Street. Maedhbh will be a huge loss to Mercy as she was an integral part of our community, involved in so many aspects of school life including her contribution to our music department and liturgical events and the many activities and events she ran as Home-School-Community-Liaison teacher. It has been my immense pleasure and privilege to work with her for the past seven and a half years. We will miss Maedhbh greatly and sincerely hope she comes back to see us regularly, particularly as we celebrate 50 years of Mercy College in 2013.

A WINDOW ON THE LANE

In December 2011, a group of fifteen Transition Year students was selected to take part in a creative writing initiative in conjunction with Fighting Words and the Hugh Lane Gallery.

Fighting Words, a creative writing centre, was founded by the Irish author Roddy Doyle and Sean Love, the former executive director of Amnesty International (Ireland). The centre helps students of all ages to develop their writing skills and to explore their love of writing in a kind and relaxing environment.

The municipal gallery was founded by Hugh Lane on Harcourt Street in 1908, and is the first known public gallery of modern art in the world. Since it relocated to Parnell Square at the top of O'Connell Street, the museum has a permanent collection and hosts exhibitions, mostly by contemporary Irish artists.

'We visited the Hugh Lane Gallery and Fighting Words once a month for six months. The beautiful artwork inspired a variety of creative genre, short stories and poetry. After months of hard work and much help from the volunteers from Fighting Words and the Hugh Lane Gallery and our teachers, we finally produced a brilliant collection of short stories and poems that would become our book!'

The book was launched on 9th October in Mercy College, with over 200 guests in attendance, including friends and families of the authors, representatives of Fighting Words and the Hugh Lane, local politicians and representatives from the Irish Times, Irish Independent and the Northside People. The wonderful book and its launch was made possible by the hard work and enthusiasm of many people. The girls would like to thank the Fighting Words Volunteers, the Production and Design team, staff of the Hugh Lane Gallery, their teachers, particularly Ms. O'Leary, Ms. Rooney, Ms. Cassidy, Ms. Dunwoody and their Principal Ms. Dwyer. They would like to extend a special thanks to Gráinne Byrne, Monica Heade and Rosemarie O'Kelly for making the launch such a success.
